
ADVENT as a season of comfort

"Comfort ye, comfort ye My people, saith your God."

love to hear these words sung in Handel's Messiah every year at Advent and Christmas time. I don't know about you, but I need "comfort" — I need help from the Lord for my own problems, and for the many people in our diocese who worry and are suffering. At this time of year, I gather, read and pray intentionally for each and every intention sent me, and then place the cards in baskets on and under the altar in my bishop's chapel.



Our Lady of Comfort and Consolation

Bishop Michael C. Barber, SJ has been bishop of the Diocese of Oakland since May 2013. Some problems can be solved by help from others: financial, medical, legal. Or relationships can be healed through change of heart or forgiveness of sins.

Yet some of our deepest wounds can only be healed by God Himself.

As a Navy chaplain, I was assigned to the aircraft carrier John C. Stennis. We were on a mission underway somewhere in the Pacific Ocean, with 5,000 sailors embarked. One night I was awakened at 3 a.m. by the duty officer who told me to get dressed and come topside.

They took me to a compartment where a 30-year-old sailor was curled up in a ball in the corner, weeping and crying. Two burly chief petty officers were standing there and said, "Chaplain, he's been like this for an hour, and we don't know why he is crying. We don't know what to do. Can you help him?" "I'll try," I said, and they left us alone.

I moved my chair over next to the anguished man, put my hand on his shoulder, and tried my best to comfort him. Inside myself, I was praying hard for him. After 30 minutes or so, he was able to stop a bit, and whispered to me, "Our baby died." He had received an email from his wife that their infant child had died.

I wish I could raise that child from the dead, like Jesus did. But Jesus did become incarnate of the Blessed Virgin Mary, he became a human being like us, born on Christmas Day, to come near to us and comfort us. And the greatest comfort Jesus can give us is to raise us and our loved ones from the dead.

There are three comings of Jesus Christ. The first was "in history," at his birth in Bethlehem. The second is "right now" today: in the Holy Eucharist, in all the sacraments, in our hearts through hearing the Scriptures, and in the needy person who comes to our St. Vincent de Paul or Catholic Charities looking for

food, clothing or housing. Remember Jesus said: "When you do it for one of these, the least of my brethren, you do it for me."

The third coming of Jesus will be at the "end of the world" – as He said, "You will see the Son of Man coming on the clouds with power and great glory."

The three comings go together. That is why the Advent Scripture readings at Mass are prophecies from Isaiah of his first coming, and references by Jesus Himself and the Book of Revelation about His final coming.

Friends, at this Advent and Christmas time, if you want to experience Comfort, give comfort. Participate in Mass and the sacraments. Go to confession and receive Him in Holy Communion. Do something to serve the poor and needy, either in person, or through your alms. May the birth of Our Savior bring you and your families great and lasting comfort. †

"I AM WITH YOU ALWAYS"

DIOCESE OF OAKLAND JOINS THE NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL WITH A 2023 CONGRESS

here's a story told about St. Teresa of Avila. Someone once said to her, "If only I had lived at the time of Jesus ... If only I had seen Jesus ... If only I had talked with Jesus!" If only, indeed! – except that Teresa responded, "But do we not have in the Eucharist the living, true, and real Jesus present before us? Why look for more?"

I love this reminder of the simple yet astounding beauty and gift of the Holy Eucharist: that in the Blessed Sacrament, Our Lord Jesus Christ truly is present. As Jesus himself said in the final words of the Gospel of Matthew, "Be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

In the Eucharist, God is among us. Heaven is on earth. Truth and Love incarnate appear under the guise of a tiny white host. The infinite and eternal has become so humble and approachable as to risk being overlooked and even dismissed.

The Eucharist changes hearts and lives

Two of my friends were simply unable to dismiss the power of the Eucharist. Each had powerful encounters with the Lord through the Blessed Sacrament that changed their lives.

"It was like the climax of my conversion story," she explained to me. Kellen Troxell, now a Theology teacher at Marin Catholic, was then 19. In her own words, she had been "living away from the Church, and looking for happiness and meaning everywhere else." Right when she'd decided to come back to the Church and had started attending Sunday Masses, some friends of hers invited her on a youth retreat as a speaker.

As they were preparing for the retreat weekend, "everyone kept talking about Adoration, Adoration, Adoration, and I didn't understand what it was; I had no idea." But when Saturday evening's Holy Hour came around, she got the picture.

"It was just a very classic, very emotional Youth Ministry Adoration experience," she said, chuckling. "There was a worship band, and it was all dark, and they had lights, but when they started playing 'Lord, I Need You,' I felt ..." She paused,



searching for words. "I'd been searching for love and had been feeling very unloved, a mess, just unworthy, I guess, and I'd done a lot of things that gave me reasons to feel shame, but at that moment I just felt the most love that I've ever felt in my entire life – this immense wave just flooded my heart. It was such an overwhelming experience of being loved by Somebody, being seen and understood all at once. I'd never felt like that before."

That wasn't the end of Jesus tugging on Kellen's heart, though -



when she came home from retreat, she had what she explains as "this huge conversion of my heart. All of my misgivings about Catholicism, things I was struggling with, God was just pulling on my heart to go deeper and deeper. It was really slow over time, but if I look back, like when did it start, Adoration was a huge pivotal moment - even though I didn't see it at the time."

Kellen received the Sacrament of Confirmation later that year, choosing St. Augustine as her patron saint. She still makes time for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. "I do love my hours in Adoration. It's always lovely. That's all you need, the peace of Christ in your life."

Another friend, St. Bonaventure parishioner Rod Chisholm, had his own life-changing encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist. Back in the day he wasn't Catholic, he said, but wanted to set a good example for his kids, so he attended Sunday Mass with his family each week. "I didn't want the kids to ask why I wasn't doing it," he explained. But when he wanted to receive Holy Communion with the rest of his family, "my son, Ben, he told me, 'Dad, you can't do that unless you believe it's the Body and Blood of Christ.' Well, I certainly wanted to believe that this is real. I thought, maybe if I just go up there, I'll have some sort of epiphany or something."

As Rod approached and reverenced the Body of Christ, "nothing really changed, but when I turned to the Chalice, I was just humbled right down to my knees. I just started crying, carrying on. My two daughters had to escort me back to our pew. It was a real epiphany for me." When they got home, he told his wife Kathy that if the Catholic Church was going to give him this, then he was going to become a Catholic. Rod entered RCIA and converted to Catholicism, and is now a proud evangelist to the faithful on the importance of receiving Holy Communion.

Rekindling the fire of the Eucharist

There are many who long for the truth and peace of Christ or yearn for experiences like Kellen's and Rod's but haven't found it yet. The Bishops of the United States of America have an answer to this cry, and the Diocese of Oakland is joining in: We're talking about the National Eucharistic Revival!

As Bishop Barber wrote in his October letter to parishes, "It is time to revive and rekindle the fire of the Eucharist in our hearts." Of the most recent Pew Research Center's survey of American trends, only one-third (31%) of those who self-identified as Catholics say they believe that "during Catholic Mass, the bread and wine actually become the body and blood of Jesus." This belief is called "transubstantiation," and is the heart of the Church's understanding of the Eucharist as the source and summit of our very faith.

The National Eucharistic Revival is in some sense a response to this situation. It gives Catholics a chance to reflect upon the centrality of the Eucharist in our lives, and to reaffirm our call to be a people nourished, fed and renewed by the Eucharist itself.

The theme of our Diocesan Eucharistic Revival comes from the Gospel of Matthew: "I Am With You Always." Christ Himself promises us that He is here with us, and invites us to renew our personal encounters with Him in this Revival. A steering committee of about 40 leaders on fire for the Lord have been chosen from parishes across the diocese to guide our own Revival, which will start with a Diocesan Eucharistic Revival Congress in September 2023.

Our Eucharistic Revival Congress will be held over two weekends in September 2023: a Spanish-language track on Sept. 8-9 and an English-language track on Sept. 15-16. We're looking forward to a time of prayer, talks, discussion, Mass, Adoration, a public procession of the Blessed Sacrament and more! With events for both youth and adults, there will be many opportunities for our hearts and souls to be renewed at this Eucharistic Revival Congress.

As St. Teresa said, "We have in the Eucharist the living, true, and real Jesus present before us" – here with us always. †

RETURNS TO ST. JOSEPH PINOLE

nspired by the Virgin Mary's "let it be done," a group of parishioners of St. Joseph Parish in Pinole have responded to the call of Father Geoffrey Baraan to restart the Guadalupana Association.

The previous Guadalupana Association closed in 2018. The Guadalupana Association of the St. Joseph Church in Pinole re-emerges with the same charism of service and faith.

Most of the directors had already served in the previous association and also serve in other parish ministries. They know the needs of the community, the religious fervor and the resources they can count on. The new board of directors was installed at the end of the Spanish Mass on Sept. 3.

Rosamaría Légier, president of the new Guadalupan Association of St. Joseph Church, says this organization is different from the parish groups that

form in some churches to celebrate the solemnity of the Virgin of Guadalupe in December. This Guadalupana Association works year-round.

"The previous association was part of the Catholic Federation of Guadalupan Associations of the Diocese of Oakland, a branch of the organization of the Apostolic Movement and Diocesan Organizations, which works under the umbrella of Latino Movements of the diocese," explained Légier. She hopes to rejoin this diocesan organization.

The Guadalupana Association in Pinole helps the sick financially and spiritually; some of the members are extraordinary ministers and take Communion to their homes or hospitals; help

needy families; serve in a homeless shelter in Richmond; and offer scholarships to students in need. The members lead rosary with a community prayer in the parish center and coordinate the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, among many other services to the community.

Nancy Meléndez is the secretary of this association and was also the secretary of the previous association. The Guadalupe association does many

good things for the parish community and for the Pinole community in general.

Despite her willingness to serve, she is concerned that both this group and the Church in general face the challenge of how to attract young people. "Young people don't want to come to church," she said.

She hopes that when the patron saint festivities of the different countries resume, such as the solemnity of the Divino Salvador del Mundo, El Señor de los Milagros, El Cristo de Esquipulas and the Assumption, among others, families will return to participate with their children, and youth may be attracted.

Board member Marina Segastume and her husband coordinate the group that organizes the patron saint's feast of El Salvador, the Divine Savior of the World.

She sees attracting more members as the primary objective to enable the new association to carry out activities. Those activities raise funds to help other groups and do charity work. She assures that serving the Church is something that is returned to people in blessings.

"I entered the Guadalupana Association for the first time almost 20 years ago and it helped me a lot spiritually, my faith grew," Marina said. "I was looking at the needs that were there and I found this group very active and everything that was done was to help those in need. I have learned a lot, not only how to help others, but also how to live together."

The Guadalupana Association is inspired by the Virgin of Guadalupe for whom Marina has a special devotion and from whom she has received many blessings in her family. "Faith is what inspires one to keep working," she said. †

Nancy Meléndez es la secretaria de esta asociación y lo fue también de la asociación anterior. Ella dijo a *The Catholic Voice* que la asociación guadalupana hace muchas cosas buenas para la comunidad de la iglesia San José y para la comunidad de Pinol en general.

Sister Mary (Josephus Mary) Hrovat, OP, a native of Cleveland, Ohio, is celebrating 60 years of religious life. She graduated from Hoban Dominican High School in Cleveland in 1962 and that June entered the Adrian Dominican Congregation. She professed her first vows on Dec. 29, 1963, and her final yows on Dec. 28, 1968.

Sister Mary holds a bachelor's degree in English from Siena Heights College (now University) in Adrian, 1970, and a master's degree in elementary education from Arizona State University, 1976.

Her first teaching assignment after profession took Sister Mary to St. Lawrence O'Toole, Oakland, where she taught at the elementary and junior high school level from 1964 to 1970. She later taught at the elementary and junior high level at All Saints School in Hayward from 1970 to 1977.

Sister Gloria Loya, PBVM, has long been teased that her appointment as Vicar for Religious in the Diocese of Monterey was due to her relationship to then-Bishop Richard Garcia, her cousin.

It is difficult, however, to imagine someone more qualified than Sister Gloria. Her teaching career spanned elementary to graduate school, which

combined with her advanced degrees led to positions as Director of Hispanic Ministry for the Diocese of San Jose and Adjunct Professor of Pastoral Theology and Hispanic Theology at the Jesuit School of Theology, Berkeley. Sister Gloria also served on the congregational leadership team from 2004-2010.

"I do deeply believe God and my parents blessed me, as I suspect they [the diocese] were looking for someone with a theological background and who was bilingual in English/Spanish," she says. "I grew up in a bilingual family and thanks to the Sisters, I was able to complete graduate studies in theology."

The responsibilities of this position included representing the bishop within the 23 religious congregations in the diocese (10 of men, 13 of women). This required much dialogue and trust-building with the bishop and individual religious.

With her Council of Religious and the congregations, the office offered Diocesan Jubilee Celebrations, retreats and days of prayer – even going virtual during the pandemic. A significant aspect of this ministry was outreach to the campesino/Latino community, which led to the most important event: bilingual retreats for mothers and daughters, a creative approach to a demonstrated need and a vehicle to build trust and understanding of women religious.

In response to the calls from Pope Francis and Bishop Danny Garcia, Sister Gloria formed a team to lead three Synodal Conferences with the ministerial and monastic religious throughout the diocese. The results are summarized in a Synodal Document that describes the lived experience of these communities within the clerical and lay communities in the diocese. "This document is a vital result and expression of my work and the work of all religious who participated," Sister Gloria said.

Like many others who are grounded in faith, she saw challenges as opportunities for personal and spiritual growth. She described some difficulties: "It is not easy to learn to really listen and encourage others to become leaders. In Latina theology many of us write and describe our 'invisible visibility' in the church. I observe this too happens with women religious in the church whose voices and leadership are too often overlooked and ignored."

Sister Gloria relied on two groups of women as support during her time as Vicar: fellow Presentation Sisters and her Council of Religious. "My Presentation Sisters of Guadalupe Community have over these years been such a support. We share our lives, struggles, prayer, love for Nano. They have been my base. We are also bilingual and are enriched by communicating in Spanish/English and welcoming our Hispanic spirituality and cultures. This gives me strength. And my Council of Religious – we worked very hard, planned, laughed, celebrated, and struggled together ... such a gift!" She also expressed that she felt she had the respect and support of the men with whom she worked, including the bishop, and especially the men religious.

Although a new Vicar for Religious has not been named, Sister Gloria has hopes for the future, saying "I pray that we do find a new Sister for this very special ministry, and soon. She must love religious life; have good communication skills; in our diocese it would be a gift if she is bilingual and bicultural – albeit not necessary! Must be able to laugh at herself and enjoy and love the church, even with its problems."

Sister Gloria plans to continue living in Monterey and ministering in the Mother-Daughter retreats, anti-trafficking work and other activities of the diocese.

BLESSED ARETHE DRUMCHAS ARETHE ARE

Putting their creativity to work to help keep girls safe from harm

THIS CHRISTMAS, THOUSANDS OF CHILDREN WILL OPEN A CHRISTMAS BOX – PERHAPS YOUR PARISH HELPS PACK GIFTS FOR BOX OF JOY OR OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD. Inside more than 5,000 of those boxes, girls will find a handmade sundress that reached her through the San Francisco Bay Area chapter of Dress a Girl Around the World.

PHOTOS BY DOMINIQUE GHEKIERE-MINTZ hat dress may be the first new one the girl has ever owned. All hers. More than clothing, the dress sends a message to her that she is full of dignity and a daughter of God. It also sends a message to those who might do her harm: Someone is looking out for this girl.

"Someone" is Suzanne Beck and the 300 women and men she leads who turn fabric, thread, buttons, bias tape and a touch of lace and ribbon into a life-changing gift. Suzanne's ministry is the answer to a prayer.

"I was active at CCOP [Catholic Community of Pleasanton] then I went through a horrific divorce," she recalled. She stepped back from her parish responsibilities.

"For about a year, I simply let the Lord take care of me."

There was a home to sell and a new, smaller home to buy.

"As things settled down, I prayed, 'OK, Lord, I'm ready. Show me

where you want me to be ... oh and if it could be creative, that would be really cool!' That was my literal prayer!"

Two weeks later, she saw something about Dress a Girl. She doesn't recall where it was, a bulletin perhaps.

"Then they were making dresses out of pillowcases. I burst into tears.

"This is it.

"I can sew. My grandpa was a tailor. He taught me to sew when I was a little girl.

"But what I'm better at is organizing people. I called a bunch of friends and said, 'Let's do this!'

"The first meeting was five gals with an ironing board in my tiny house in Livermore," she recalled.

Dress a Girl Around the World was founded in 2009 in Arizona









by Rachel Cinader. A group had begun in Sacramento. The ambassador there helped Suzanne learn how to proceed.

Suzanne's reaction: "Okay. We can do this." She became the ambassador for the San Francisco Bay Area.

"In May 2011, we had our first meeting at St. Augustine, Pleasanton. We made 30 or 40 dresses.

"We took off from there."

A few months later, Father Bob Mendonca, then pastor at St. Michael Parish in Livermore, assisted Suzanne in starting Dress a Girl as a ministry.

The local group has partnered with Christian organizations to deliver the dresses, such as the two Christmasoriented organizations. The dresses are never just sent away; they are carried by YOU GET

missionaries or, on occasion, by local travelers.

The San Francisco Bay Area group is the grateful beneficiary of grants from St. Charles Borromeo Parish in Livermore, Amador Valley Quilters and Wooden Gate Quilts in Danville.

They are also grateful to the individuals who donate fabric collections and sewing supplies, either as a bequest or at a time of downsizing.

"It's nice to be able to say,
'I know this is going to a good
cause. I know this isn't going to
be wasted.'

"We use every little piece we get," she said. "Whatever we don't use, we pass on to someone else."

The group is also happy to receive gift cards from Joann Fabrics, which the bargain-savvy shopper can use to get the most for their money.

THEN THERE'S THE LOVE STORY.

Six months after starting her ministry, Suzanne went to Indiana to attend her high school reunion.

"I reconnected with a guy I'd known since 6th grade," she said, when she, the daughter of a fundamentalist minister, moved into Eric's classroom. "We were good friends for years, but each had moved on with our lives."

He, too, had gone through a divorce and raised four children by himself. The last child had gone off to college, and he was wondering what he would do next.

Eric and Suzanne each obtained an annulment and were married.

"We couldn't do Dress a Girl without him," Suzanne said. "He unloads, packs everything, hooks up electricity at Sew-Fests." He also takes dresses to the warehouse, where they are stored ready to travel.

Vital to the work, too, is Suzanne's mother, Anne, who precisely packs the dresses for shipping.

The Dress a Girl group meets every six weeks or so for a Sew-Fest. They come together to sew, iron and put together dress kits. Three or four volunteers work behind the scenes, making thousands of yards of bias tape for the dress straps. This saves the rather expensive cost of the bias tape, allowing more dresses to be made.

Especially sharp-eyed volunteers give each dress a thorough going-over, noting spots that need repair. The majority that pass inspection go the ironing board, where a small Dress a Girl Around the World patch is attached to the front. It's there to remind people: Someone cares for me.

Some of the dressmakers bring their own sewing machines, and work on their dresses at long tables Eric has set up earlier in the day. They admire each other's work, and offer tips to newcomers.





The simple sundresses, in sizes 4 to 14, are adorned with pockets. "We're insistent on two pockets on every dress," Suzanne said. "Sometimes it's the only place a girl has that's her own private place."

It's a place of community, where the day begins with prayer.

When the pandemic came, the dressmakers picked up kits on the front patio of Suzanne's home and dropped off finished dresses there.

2021 was the group's most successful: 6,515 dresses were made.

Sew-Fests began again in 2022, at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Livermore. The 2023 dates are Jan. 14, Feb. 25, April 1, May 6 and June 10.

Dress a Girl "has been a huge blessing to everyone involved. You get as much blessing out of doing what you're doing than the end-user gets out of what you've done."

"So many people have gotten so much blessing from using their hands, using their creativity. We don't much of that these days." †

Funds raised at the Champions Gala will go a long way toward the plan to double the size of the medical clinic, which will allow the clinic to expand the number of patients served and days it is open. **†**

hristmas has always been a joyous celebration in our family. My first Midnight Mass was as a first-grader, chosen by Sister Mary Finbar to carry the Baby Jesus up the aisle during the offertory and not to drop him, but to place him right side up in the manger. Garbed in a white gown and gold wire wings, accompanied by three other "good girls," we were the angels on that Holy Night. My family: mother, father, baby sister, sat behind in the pews. My mother, most likely, holding her breath, wiping the tears of joy off her cheeks as her nine-year-old firstborn, my brother David, dressed in the red and white altar boy cassock, gave the responses in newly learned Latin.

Many Christmas Eves past. My husband and I were blessed with eight of our very own "babies," cradled and carried each in turn up the church aisle to be baptized: Children of God.

Christmas was even merrier. Messier. Not with swaddling clothes but baskets of soiled clothes.

Our children married and had their children. Christmas was family and friends, carols and chaos but celebratory. The dinners and dishes grew in portion. I grew older.

It was on the heels of one Christmas Eve when our whole family went to our parish church of St. Mary Magdalen, leaving the two dozen green and red frosted chocolate cupcakes for an early

Christmas morning dessert on the dining room table that my spirits started to sag. My family, filling the two church pews for that Midnight Mass, was my Christmas gift. Like my own Mother, years before, I was filled with gratitude. JOY.

The kids burst in the front door after Mass to find our lab, Ashley, had got to the cupcakes first.

The glass platter still in place. Licked clean.

With the gift of time and perspective, I realize I was just exhausted when the day after that Christmas, The Feast of The Holy Family, I quietly took the car keys, climbed out the laundry room window and drove up the coast to Jenner By the Sea.

I checked into a motel, had just let my head sink into a crisp, clean pillowcase when a family checked in to the next room. The kids jumped on the beds and squealed. Their parents shouted and shushed them. Their dog barked.

Within ten minutes I was back in our family Volvo. Luckily there were leftovers for dinner.

It was on that solo drive home that I had the quiet time to go back in time. Like Mary, ponder these things, this sacred season in my heart. I searched for what the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph could teach me. Something I could carry with me.

We know much about Jesus in His later years. But Mary did not keep a journal. We have her words, her response to the angel Gabriel, "Behold the Handmaid of the Lord. Be it done unto me according to your word." We also know



from Scripture that in spite of her own pregnancy, she traveled on a donkey (not in a Volvo) to visit her cousin, Elizabeth. Given the closeness of cousins Mary, Elizabeth, Jesus and John, I can imagine many such visits: the comfort the two women felt, sharing stories of their boys.

We know the story of the "family trip" where their only child, pre-teen Jesus, goes missing. We can imagine the fear both Mary and Joseph felt as well as their relief of finding him safely, sitting, teaching in the Temple. But also feel the pang that this 12-year-old boy of theirs was breaking away. He was beginning "His Father's business." Family life had changed.

As parents, many of us have felt that pang as our firstborn steps into their college dorm and tells us, "Ok, I'm all set. You can go home now." We have to trust that we have given our children all that we could to go on this next journey. Like young Jesus, to step into themselves. That they, too, are in God's hands.

Scripture tells us little about Joseph but facta non verba, it is what he does that speaks volumes. He steps up. Assumes responsibility. He is steadfast. Loving. Humble. "Humility is a calm, clear-sighted virtue... It gives us spiritual common sense, enabling us to see and act toward things as they are." (Father Walter Farrell, OP)

Joseph, both foster father and carpenter by trade, was the role model for young Jesus. I like to imagine he built a table for their family and friends to gather,

I stepped through our front door to find the dining room table set; leftover roast beef ready in a much cleaner kitchen. No one bothered to ask where I had been. "Mom's home! Can we eat now?" Jesus himself had given it, "Where ever two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of you."

FROM FATHER GEOFFREY BARAAN'S HOMILY ON SEPT. 18:

Through the inspiration of St. Joseph, the Husband of Mary, our community has become a visible sign of God's love in Christ our Savior.

Miracles do happen and sometimes they start from a small beginning. In your case, it started 75 years ago in 1947 on Sept. 25.

FROM THE HISTORY BOOK:

The first St. Joseph Church was a wooden structure built in 1881. In 1884 it became a mission of St. Paul Church in San Pablo. But in 1923 it became a mission of the newly formed St. Patrick Church in Rodeo. On Sept. 4, 1947, Father Flatley, Pastor of St. Patrick Church wrote Archbishop John Mitty of San Francisco to say that St. Joseph Community could care of itself. On Sept. 25, 1947, St. Joseph Church became a parish.

OUR LADY OF GRACE PARISH IN CASTRO VALLEY

The centerpiece for the 75th anniversary of Our Lady of Grace Parish in Castro Valley was a bilingual noon Mass celebrated by Bishop Michael C. Barber, SJ on Sept. 18. The Mass was followed by a Fiesta Mexicana lunch provided by the parish's Hispanic community. Branch #343 of the Italian Catholic Federation provided a ravioli dinner the night before.

The festivities continued the following weekend with a small car show and a live concert featuring the Rev Tones and the Night Owls.

A Family Fun Day concluded the event.

Our Lady of Grace Parish in Castro Valley was established on Sept. 19, 1947. Its first Masses were held in a temporary hall on Baker Road. Mass in its newly completed building on Anita Avenue was celebrated on Easter Sunday 1948.





By the early 1950s, the rapid growth of the parish made it clear that a larger facility, including a school, was necessary. But the church only had \$8,000 in the bank and the archbishop would not loan the additional \$458,000 needed to build a larger church and a school.

Therefore, 400 parishioners, under the leadership of then pastor Father Patrick J. Stack, took on the task of a \$450,000 capital campaign.

Our Lady of Grace School was opened in September 1955; the TK-8 school is still a vibrant and integral part of the parish. The current church on Somerset Avenue opened in 1957 along with a new convent on Anita Avenue.

But the Church is more than just buildings; it is people. Over the years, thousands have found Our Lady of Grace Church to be a place of faith, hope, love and community.

As author and parishioner Mark Cotta Vaz writes in his new book about the parish, to be released later this year: "In a spiritual community, one's life becomes a process of cultivating divine growth, allowing its good fruits to take root and blossom in the world. Like an athlete, we train to run the race, but in the mystery of one mystical body, our spiritual growth is not solely about transforming and disciplining ourselves alone, but in humbly realizing that we cannot prepare for and achieve something as mysterious as eternal life on our own." †
